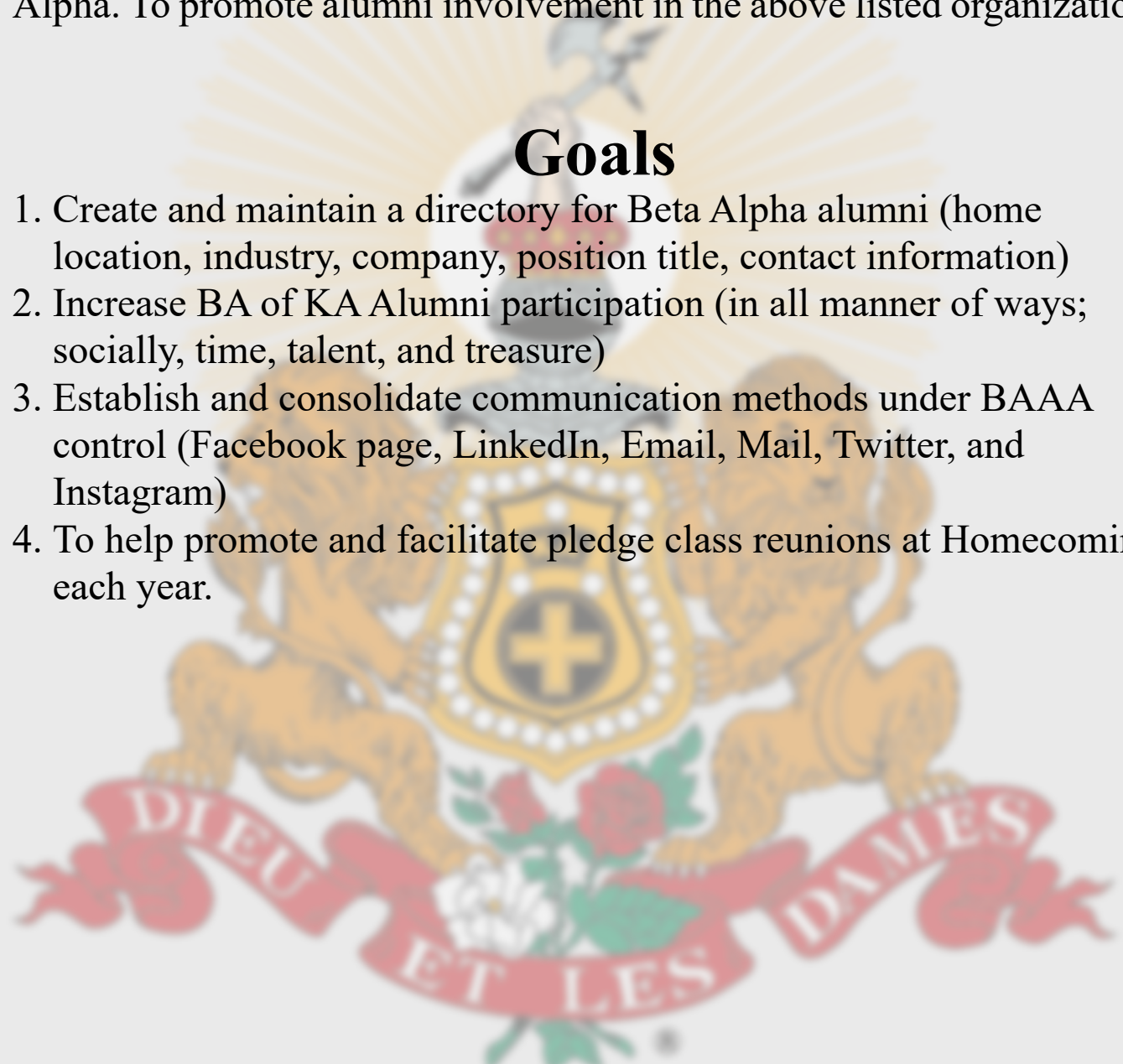


Mission Statement

SELF Board

Beta Alpha Educational Foundation

The SELF Board did not meet in April due to COVID-19 concerns, however an update from the following areas was distributed to the Board members: Financial Report, House Report, No. 1's Report, BAEF report, Campus report, and the BAAA report. The house was closed during mid-March due to the University shifting to online classes only. This resulted in SELF being unable to collect nearly two months of payments from the active chapter; the plan to recoup this deficit will be over a 5 year period by increasing the monthly payment due from the active chapter a little more quickly than otherwise. In addition, the SELF board negotiated an extension to the mortgage payments to make them interest only for 6 months since it was unclear when the chapter house would reopen.

The SELF Board formed a committee in May which included Brothers Sowers, Schmidt, Hennessey, Borgmann, Markus, and Bradley to develop guidelines to re-open the house in August during the age of Covid. Included in the plan was the decision to upgrade the HVAC system to include UV purification to each unit so air recirculating throughout the house would be free of bacteria and germs. The plan also included each brother to pass a University approved scan before entering the house, capacities for each common area to social distance, hand sanitizing stations at each point of ingress, limitations on visitors, the requirement to wear masks in common areas, plating meals so brothers would eat in their rooms, etc. These guidelines would be subsequently relaxed if both the house and the campus case counts declined to low levels.

The SELF board will likely meet virtually in October and plans are underway to continue the tradition of awarding scholarships to the active chapter members, however that too will be virtual.

Travels - Evan Thibaud

For most of us the pandemic has meant staying safe and staying home; unless you made a promise in Turkey to return your friend's van to Norway and you get stuck at the Albanian border in Greece. Evan Thibaud (PC '08) started his trip May of 2019 hitchhiking from Bermuda to Portugal by sailing across the Atlantic.

“My goal was to make it to Istanbul for a friend’s wedding I had met in Mexico four years prior. At the end of my month in Turkey, I met a Norwegian guy (Erik) at a hostel who had been traveling by Van to India. When Erik found out he wouldn’t be able to pass through Iran because of missing his Visa window, he offered for me to drive his van back to Norway for him. Unfortunately, the next day I left for Italy. It ended up being another

month before Erik contacted my friend and asked why I didn’t follow up on the van before I had left. I responded “What the hell was I supposed to ask?! Remember last night after we had some tequila you were going to give me your VAN?”. Turned out this was exactly what I was supposed to ask. If I could get from Prague to Istanbul in the next five days, the van would be mine for as long as I wanted under the sole condition I return the van to him in Norway.

So began my epic adventure. My friend, a Mining Engineer and a Sig Tau from Rolla joined me in Bucharest and we explored the mountains of Transylvania, eventually crossing into Moldova, Transnistria (a country I didn’t even know existed until the day before I was attempting to visit), and Ukraine together before he continued his journey to NZ for his next job. Now alone, I continued on to Poland and Hungary, through the Balkans to Greece.

Evan had been working in Athens at the start of the COVID-19 pandemic and found himself unable to cross the border to Albania to continue his trip. With it being too cold to want to return to his sailboat home in Chattanooga Evan was determined to keep his promise to return the Van. After being chased out of a few towns by the police, he found a beach in Nea Michaniona he would be able to stay at with free wifi until he was able to cross the border into Albania, over two months later. This was the first time Evan had been stationary in more than nine months of intense travelling.



“I finally had a chance to slow my life down and reconcile with being alone during my journey, discover financial education, and rethink my diet and how poorly I was taking care of myself. I was alone except for the old men who would walk the beach every day. I made a connection with them that is hard to explain, they were very nice to me and would bring me food all the time. I’m very extroverted but being alone helps you understand yourself and your needs, and you become very okay with that.

Travelling has opened my eyes to many big aspects of life but also small ones. I have been able to drastically improve my networking and career possibilities. Walking into a conference and meeting someone and being able to say cheers to them in their native language is fun. The conversation quickly changes from work to the adventures that can be found in their country and they love to share. Before you

know it, you exchanged business cards without ever talking about work.

Launching myself out of my comfort zone taught me more lessons than I could have imagined. I’m often travelling alone so it helps build confidence and open myself up to new cultures and ideas. By learning how to see the good in other cultures and religions I can now understand other’s points of view while remaining critical of them and myself. This happens randomly like when I was checking into a flight in Nicaragua and the customs agent asked me my Nationality and I responded with American and she was upset and bounced back saying everyone in North and South America are “Americans”. I could tell there was a lot of history behind her statement but all I could say was I am from the United States of “America ” and I didn’t mean to sound condescending.

One issue I struggle with since traveling is seeing people back in The States complain on social media while the rest of the world dreams of living in the USA. I still get chills when I think of the time I heard a short Thai man perfectly sing the Jay-Z song about New York City having streets paved in gold. It’s a figure of speech but the world really does see the opportunity the USA presents for a more prosperous life. Many of us take for granted our wildlife and land management which is envied around the world. The ability to own a gun and hunt is more difficult in many places and we take for granted all wild animals we see while driving down the road.

I miss how unquestionably diverse we are in America. Even in Rolla, you see students from around the world who have parents who saved their whole lives to send those students to America for a better education, an opportunity to better their English and a shot at a potential career. We are a conglomerate of religions and ethnicities trying to get along in a country with more land and population than most. This is what makes us wonderful but also adds extremely controversial subjects many other countries don't have to deal with because they're a majority of one religion or race. I don't believe we have it as bad as many other countries, we only see it and experience it more because there isn't a country in the world as economically strong and diverse as us. I am not going to act like I have seen the whole world or even remotely grasp the complexities of it but I do know the mindset in the USA has shifted

from being proud of our diversity to seeing it as a problem. We have a great room for improvement and we should work towards that as KAs and as citizens.

I remember being a student and participating in the Celebration of Nations with the BBQ Club and experiencing how wildly unique our fellow students were. I was not aware, nor interested at the time, as to what there was to learn but now I see how great such an event is. The food, the dance, and clothing are the first and obvious contrasts seen but once you dig deeper you can see why certain foods in a region are dominant or how the dance was influenced from other nations over time. All of this is learned slowly but naturally and I realized most of us all want to have good jobs and to be happy regardless of which region we come from.

There isn't a clean way to wrap up the story about Evan because hell, he doesn't even know how it will end. What I can tell you is that Evan has demonstrated gentility, kindness, and a dedication to the community around him in a way quite rare in a time of such social and physical isolation. He has taken his experience from KA and begun to forge his own path in a way most of us wouldn't even consider. I hope this article finds you safe and well; we will get by, we will survive.
